## Mentoring **PROGRAMS**

## Big Brothers Big Sisters **MENTORING**

The Big Brothers Big Sisters Mentoring program provides boys and young men, and girls and young women with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up with. Through regular outings, a relationship is developed between the mentor and the mentee that is built on trust and common interests, and is supported by our experienced case-workers. The result is a life-changing experience for both the mentor and the mentee.

The Big Brothers Big Sisters Mentoring program usually requires two regularly scheduled outings a month of several hours each and a minimum of 1 year commitment.

### In-School **MENTORING**

Go back and help a child go forward. Studies show that mentoring helps kids stay in school, avoid risky behavior such as bullying, and grow up having more respect for family, peers and community.

Helping children reach their full potential can lead to positive community outcomes like a reduction in poverty and unemployment, safer schools and neighborhoods, and a new generation of civic-minded adults.

The In School Mentoring program provides girls and boys with a role model and a friend to talk to and share the experiences of growing up with, within school grounds. For one hour a week, mentors meet with their mentee and engage in activities such as board games, crafts or just hang out in the playground.

The In School Mentoring program requires a weekly visit of 1 hour for the duration of the school year. Matches do not meet over the summer break or during other school holidays.

### **In-School Mentoring Makes a Big Difference**

- · 90% of mentors saw a positive change in the child they were mentoring
- · 88% of students showed improved literacy skills
- · 64% had developed higher levels of self-esteem

## Teen **MENTORING**

Teen Mentoring is for caring and responsible teen volunteers in grades 11 & 12 who wishes to provide encouragement and friendship to a child. Besides playing with play-doh, painting and having fun, you will be a role model to one student. Through friendship, guidance and sharing, you will help build a child's self-esteem.

Children who spend time with a Mentor gain confidence, acquire new skills and competencies, and develop an enhanced capacity to care for others.

Mentors experience a sense of discovery and enjoyment as they see the world of possibility open up through a child's eye. Gain experience for working with children, build and enhance leadership, interpersonal and teamwork skills. Volunteering is also a great way to build your resume.

One child, one hour a week. It's a small commitment that makes a big difference. Become a mentor to a child in a school environment. You will help build a child's self-esteem and school performance while having a lot of fun. And it only takes one a week during the school year.

## Other **PROGRAMS**

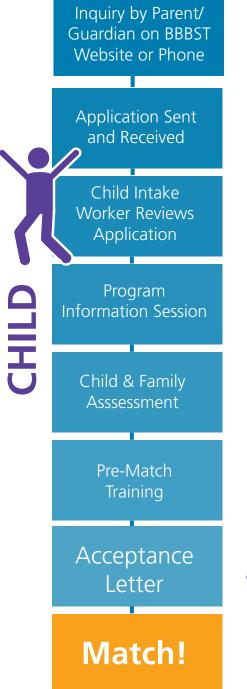
Big Brothers Big Sisters has other programs available to meet the unique needs of our community. Some of the programs being offered in our community include: Couples for Kids

The good thing about this program is that you can see your little together or separately, allowing for one volunteer to spend time with your Little even when the other is too busy to join in the activities.

## The Match **PROCESS**

Matching a child with a mentor is an intense process dictated by strict standards of child safety. A tremendous amount of time, care and effort is taken to ensure our matches are successful.







## Report from the **TREASURER**

Total revenues in 2015 fell by 9% or \$22,661 to \$243,450 due primarily to an expected drop in grants after one-time grants were received in 2014, as well as notification from funders that grants would be down this year due to the economic outlook in the province.

Total fundraising and donation activities however compare favorably year-over-year, increasing by 22% or \$46,433, highlighted by individual donations received under the Birdies for Kids program our organization joined in 2015.

Overall expenses decreased by 1%. Excluding wages, expenses were reduced by 7% or\$13,000 as the organization made efforts to save costs wherever possible without harming the programming offered to the community.

Salaries and benefits costs, our largest expense, increased by 6% or \$10,622 as our matches continued to grow. The organization decided to service the increased demand for Big and Little matches rather than cutting back by financing programs using cash reserves.

The above resulted in a net deficiency of revenue over expenses, or loss, of \$19,763 compared to a deficit of \$7 last year.

The Agency's financial condition as reflected in the Statement of Financial Position, while weakened due to the deficits incurred in 2015, nevertheless remains healthy. We continued to meet our strategic objectives in 2015 without significantly reducing the organization's cash reserves and ended the year with nearly \$127,000 in cash and securities in our accounts.

While we expect 2016 to reflect a challenging environment for charitable organizations, we're optimistic that we can continue to work creatively and manage our resources in a manner that will enable the Agency to remain at the forefront of providing our children and youth with mentoring that makes a BIG difference.
