MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Our staff and volunteers are the heart beat of this organization; they give light to the opportunities that enable life changing mentoring relationships to ignite the power and potential of young people.

2019 was a remarkable year, creating a benchmark for many years to come. In 2019 we delivered more programs, to more young people, than we have in the past ten years. We have offered programs to over 300 young people, delivered 1600 individual connections through mentorship experiences and over 2600 volunteer hours. Each time we match a young person with a mentor, we start a life changing relationship built on friendship, trust and empowerment. Every child deserves a championan adult who will be there for them, who understands the power of human connection and insists that they become the best they can be.

We can operate with confidence because of the financial support we receive from sponsors, donors, grant giving organizations and fundraisers. We are humbled by the individuals and organizations that continue to give to the young people in our community; thank you!

In 2019 our BBBS National organization launced a new brand, along with that came a new logo, vision and mission. We are excited to let our new brand guide us into the future.

Our programs are made possible by the staff and volunteers that help us to serve our community. With profound sadness, we said goodbye to long time mentor and volunteer Rhys Jalbert and Board member Paul Shultz this past year. While we mourn the loss of Paul and RHys, we find comfort in remembering the gifts they shared as volunteers.

MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER



The organization is incredibly proud of the financial progress that we made in 2019. Our cash position has improved significantly from the prior year due to extensive planning, budgeting, and a tremendous amount of hard work within the Agency.

Our Statement of Operations shows a small decrease in revenue; this is largely due to grant revenue decreasing by \$29,749 in comparison to the prior year. This decrease in grant revenue showing on the Statement of Operations is offset by a \$125,000 Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) grant that we received in November 2019. This grant has been deferred until we can effectively utilize the funds, so it is being shown on the Statement of Financial Position instead of the 2019 Statement of Operations.

The Statement of Operations also shows an increase in expenses, this is largely due to an increase in payroll as we hired an additional part time employee to keep up with growing program demands. Fundraising expenses also increased by \$9,846 or 22% while fundraising revenues only decreased by \$4,794 or 2%. The main contributor to this increase in fundraising expenses was Ribs for Kids. This event was moved to a new location and this year we offered more diversity and exhibits to attendees which increased the cost of the event.

The Organization is currently focusing on highlighting and enhancing the existing fundraisers which have performed well in the past and are expected to perform well into the future, such as Bowl for Kids' Sake, Birdies for Kids, and the MDA Golf Tournament. A focus on decreasing expenses has also proved successful in previous years for the Organization and continues to be a goal in future years.

All other lines on the Financial Statement remain relatively static with no notable increase or decrease. The Statement of Financial Position provides a clear snapshot of our cash on hand at year-end, this is one of the best cash positions the Organization has seen in several years. We continued to meet our strategic objectives in 2019 while also managing to grow our assets. The Organization continues to keep some of our cash in reserves; increasing these reserves is a goal that we hope to achieve in the coming years.

We continue to believe that if we focus our work on building a stronger presence in the community, paired with optimistic, yet realistic fundraising goals, we can continue to produce positive financial results in the future. We are confident that our programs will continue to make a difference to the children and youth of this community!

Traditional Mentoring

This program is the one we are most known for. Through the Traditional Mentoring Program, a mentor is matched with a child with similar interests. The mentor will pick the child up and take them on an outing within the community, exposing the child to new experiences, and opportunities. Through regular outings, a relationship is developed between the mentor and the mentee, which is built on trust and common interests, and is supported by our experienced coordinators. Spending a few hours per week provides children and youth with a role model to talk to and share the experiences of growing up. The result is a life-changing experience for both the mentor and the mentee.

In 2019 alone, our Littles received a total of 6396 hours of mentoring through our Traditional Program. Our Mentoring Coordinators must stay in contact with each match for a total of 1148 times and for every time they interact with our matches it created 2870 total processes of paper work and data entry.

In School Mentoring

The In School Mentoring program is like the Traditional Program however, all meetings are held at the Little's School. The adult mentor will visit the mentee for one hour every week, excluding school holidays, and build a friendship. They are welcome to go outside and play games, read together, do a craft, or play a board game. This program is extremely successful for school aged children who are withdrawn in class, lack self-esteem, are bullying or being bullied. The In School Mentoring Program provides youth with a positive role model and a friend to talk to and share the experience of growing up, within the confines of the school. We have many matches that begin in In School and move to the Traditional program.

Our matches meet one hour per week throughout the school year for a total of 650 volunteer hours from the start of the school year to the end of May! Mentoring Coordinators provided Match Support in 2019 338 times. 936 processes of contact and recording were completed.

Teen Mentoring

Our Teen Mentoring Program matches High School and Upper Middle School Teens with Elementary School Students one to one but in a group setting supervised by one our Mentoring Coordinators. This program runs 8-15 weeks.



Game On is a group mentoring program for boys in grade 7, that focuses on physical activity, self-confidence, healthy eating and relationships. The single, most important goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of young men by helping them build a positive selfimage-setting them on a path to reach their full potential. The Game On program consists of seven, 75 minute mentoring sessions. 2019 was the first time in years we were able to deliver this program to a group of boys. This was due to the partnership with the Medicine Hat College Nursing Students as part of their Clinical Pracitcum.

Our Group Mentoring Programs has shown the largest growth in 2019. Reaching 54 children and youth through the site based group programming.





Go Girls! Is a group mentoring program for girls ages 11-13, that focuses on physical activity, self-esteem, healthy eating and relationships. The single, most important goal of the program is to positively shape the lives of young women and girls by helping them build a positive self-image-setting them on a path to reach their full potential. The Go Girls! program consists of seven, 75 minute mentoring sessions. The 7 week sessions are structured around several key themes: physical activity, healthy eating, eating disorders, bullying, selfesteem and communication skills. This program has grown over the past few years and is delivered to more girls and more schools in the past 3 years. This program is delivered in partnership with the Medicine Hat College Nursing Students as part of their Clinical Practicum.




